From the Chairman

Apparently St Augustine of Hippo did not say, 'The one who sings prays twice.' (BTW, the Latin original has no male pronoun, so my translation is completely justified.)

I was once at a service where just before communion the congregation broke into Sister Janet Mead's setting of the Lord's Prayer. I admit up front that it's not 'my kind of music', but while singing it in that service, I realised that I was singing a song, not praying a prayer. I have heard of churches using Cliff Richard's 'Millenium Prayer', which put the words to 'Auld Lang Syne'.

Yet I have no problem singing (and praying) the Lord's Prayer to traditional chant in a Roman Catholic Mass, just as was the case when Anglicans used to sing it to Merbecke in a very similar style, i.e. syllabic chanting. Similarly, John Farmer's four-part setting which is frequently performed in Choral Evensong works as a prayer for me, whether as singer or hearer.

The three examples I have just cited all move straight through the text, just as one would when reciting the prayer, with no musical 'tricks' such as textual or musical repetition, or melisma. Mead's 'Our Father', by contrast, employs a Rondo format, so that the opening section of the song returns in the middle and at the end. I think it's that which makes it a song rather than a prayer. Cliff Richard's version has an extended doxology which repeats words, and also introduces text that is not from the liturgy (which alone should exclude it from use in a service).

It may be that my opening quote comes from St Gregory the Great, after whom Gregorian Chant is named. For church people of that time, singing meant the chant; there was a single melodic line only, and musical form and repetition as we know it today had not been invented.

It may be that sometimes church musicians need to point out that not everything that is prayed in worship should be sung. There are some superb settings of collects (Gibbons's 'Almighty and everlasting God' and Thomas Mudd's 'Let thy merciful ears, O Lord' come to mind) which are excellent anthems, but which I suspect no one would ever perform in place of the actual collect.

Do you disagree with me? If you do, great. Let the Editor know (of course any such disagreement would be phrased courteously and respectfully). Creating liturgy is always a matter of making choices, and it is always good to consider why we are making choices. I think the worst liturgy and church music arise out of 'We've always done it this way'!

And I haven't even mentioned Albert Malotte's 1935 setting for vocal solo, once sung memorably by Barry Humphries' character Sandy Stone.

Regarding the AGM:

Thank you to those who came to our Annual General Meeting. There was constructive discussion about the issues facing us with regard to our participation in the national RSCM, and I thank you for that. Your Committee will continue teasing out ideas as the next meeting of National Council at the end of May approaches.

It was good to welcome Steven Secker back to Committee after a couple of decades' break, and we look forward to his contribution. By contrast, having our first Committee meeting for a couple of decades without Deirdre Russell there took some getting used to.
