

FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dear Friends

I am writing this on the afternoon of Good Friday. It has become the pattern that I get home from church, make my lunch and settle down to listen to some appropriate music. What to choose? Stainer's *Crucifixion* – but I had the pleasure of accompanying the St Barnabas Singers in their performance at St Edmund's, Wembley a week ago. It might be one of the Bach Passions, but this year I settled for Part 2 of *The Apostles* by Elgar.

We are so fortunate to have ready access to good performances of great works. Adrian Boult's 1974 recording of *The Apostles* was the only one until 2012 when Mark Elder's performance with the Hallé Orchestra was released. We're unlikely to have it performed in this country: it is Elgar's largest musical canvas, with very large orchestra, organ, chorus, semi-chorus and six soloists. It's also perhaps too overtly Christian for these times while not having the performance tradition of *Messiah* behind it. Elgar's focus on the repentance of Judas is masterly, and heaven seems indeed to open in the final Ascension section.

RSCM exists to remind us that we must also value and support live performance in churches. Some have wonderful musical resources, others do wonderful things with just a few willing people. I trust that all our members have enjoyed a spiritually fulfilling Holy Week and Easter with good music in the mix.

Immediately before the Wembley *Crucifixion* performance I mentioned above, I had the privilege of playing the organ for the funeral of Murray Russell, husband of Deirdre, our former Chairman, in a packed-out Willetton Uniting Church. Revd Stuart Good, another former Chairman, shared in the conduct of the service. Two of Murray's and Deirdre's grandchildren sang solos, and the family together sang Howard Goodall's 'The Lord is my shepherd'. There were a number of faces from past Junior Choir Camps in that family group, testament not only to what we can give young people on Camp, but also to Deirdre's enthusiasm to ensure that members of her family were able to take part in them. Our thoughts and prayers continue to be with Deirdre and the family.

The Branch's focus now turns towards this year's Camp, to be held in Narrogin in July. Please put the fund-raising concert at St Patrick's, Mount Lawley on 11 June into your diary and start encouraging your friends, family and even people you don't particularly like to come to what will be a very worthwhile afternoon of fine musical performances.

Please keep Jacinta Jakovcevic, Steven Secker and myself in your prayers as we prepare to travel to Adelaide at the end of May for National Council. As those who were at our AGM know, there are some difficult issues that need to be faced.

I look forward to seeing people at our forthcoming events.

WHAT'S IN THE RSCM LIBRARY Report by Sheila Byfield.

As most of you know, when the Uniting Church in Claremont had renovations, our Library had to be moved, and it ended up in boxes in Carol Crass' garage. However, last year, St. Patrick's Church at Mt. Lawley allowed us to move it into a small room in their hall. So far, members of the committee have unpacked and arranged multi-copy anthems, masses, a few evensong responses, psalms, festival service books, organ music, and some other items, but there are still a large number of single copies yet to be categorized.

On Sunday, April 2nd, a small group of members gathered to see what is going on in the RSCM Library. We had a quick sing-through of some pieces—The Mass of St. Chad by Gordon Appleton, written for Choristers' Camp some years ago, The Mass of the Quiet Hour by Oldroyd, and a Mass by W. Mathias, "Brother James' Air" by G.Jacob, and a very operatic "There is a Green Hill" by Gounod.

There is a container full of old melody line English Hymnals, and another container full of old Psalters. If anyone would like these please contact the committee.

Although there is not a formal "borrowing system" set up at this stage, if you wish to go and look at the library, or borrow from it, please contact Sheila Byfield, and we can arrange access for you.

RSCM SUMMER SCHOOL, ADELAIDE, JANUARY, 2017

I attended the 2017 RSCM Summer School in Adelaide to complete my Gold Award. Whilst I'm extremely pleased to have received it with honours, there were a host of other memorable experiences that I found interesting and beneficial to my studies as a university music student.

As well as being my first Summer School, it was also the first time I've been to Adelaide. Whilst similar to Perth (with the hot weather persisting for the first few days), some notable differences were the abundance of beautiful churches and restored heritage, and the closeness of the hills to the ocean that I noticed from the aeroplane and from in the city.

Within hours of arriving at Aquinas College I felt at home. It was reminiscent of St George's College here in Perth, where I sang a weekly evensong with the Winthrop Singers in my first year at UWA. Whilst the grounds felt familiar, the majority of people at the Summer School weren't, so I naturally felt a little overwhelmed. I needn't have worried though, as meal times quickly became a way for me to meet fellow church musicians from around Australia and New Zealand who were welcoming and eager to chat.

Something I found really interesting from the conversation at lunch was the richly ecumenical nature of the group. Between these conversations and the opportunity to sing evening prayer services at churches of differing denominations, I felt like I got a real insight into the differences and similarities in faith that I hadn't previously been aware of. Whilst I'm no stranger to singing in a choir, the repertoire we covered for these services was exhilarating, and Malcolm Archer was a superb director.

Whilst all the workshops and presentations I attended were informative and enjoyable, a highlight was attending (and being a part of) Jacinta's workshop on J.E. Dodd, and a presentation of music of the period on a Dodd organ. Learning so much about this particular subject, and organs in general, was something I hadn't thought about prior to the Summer School, but is something I'm glad to have experienced.

After juggling times to sit the exam for the Gold Award, the day finally came. The different components of the assessment were numerous and extensive, but I went in confident from the preparation I'd done in the months leading up to the Summer School, and from the knowledge and skills I've amassed from singing at St Mary's Cathedral for about 10 years. Fortunately it all went well, and I left the exam feeling like I'd done as well as I could have hoped.

The trip to Adelaide was a unique experience that I'll remember as a highlight in my musical career so far. The knowledge and experience I gained from completing the award and participating in the Summer School has changed the way I sing, as well as the way I think about singing in a church music context.
