

Dear friends

It's been a particularly busy couple of months, with both our Singing Camp and our Choral Festival taking place over a short time. They were, of course, linked in that the repertoire from Camp fed into the Festival, and we were delighted to have a number of young people and tutors from Camp join us.

Firstly Singing Camp: an edited report appears in WestNews from Lucas Philips, the Camp Coordinator. This is an opportunity to thank him for the great amount of work he did to make the event function, which included having to deal with a fairly late withdrawal of accommodation from one organisation. Lucas is standing aside from coordinating the next camp, but he will be part of the team that creates next year's event. Jane Beaverstock will coordinate the 2019 Camp, and Sally Hemsley and Theo Messenger will oversee 2020 – a pleasing example of good succession planning.

It was a delight to be part of the choir at our Choral Festival in St George's Cathedral. We sang Stanford's setting of the Canticles in B flat – a long-standing favourite which, as well as being a great piece to sing, has an important place in the history of the music of the Church of England, as it was the start of a fresh approach to church music following the rather more staid output of earlier Victorian composers. The anthem was a recent setting of 'Brother James's Air' and was enriched with the addition of a flute part. The Gospel piece 'Hold up your lantern', sung from the west end of the cathedral, made for a rousing start to the service, and brought into our musical offering a piece from the workshop held in May. Performing these varied pieces is part of how RSCM envisages music choice – finding the best from different sources.

The festival was another opportunity to give thanks for the lives of Dudley Bastian and Gordon Appleton, both former Directors of Music at St George's, and it was fitting (albeit coincidental) that the hymn 'How shall I sing that majesty' – one of Gordon's favourites – was included in the service.

After a rest in September, we resume with events at either end of October. The workshop with Stephen Darlington on Saturday, 6 October at St Mary's Cathedral, running 10am—1pm, is being run in conjunction with the local chapter of the Australian National Choral Association. Full details will be with us soon, and we will send those out by email when we have them. The HymnFest featuring hymns by Timothy Dudley-Smith is on 27 October atWilletton Uniting Church (please note the change of venue) at 2pm, and information will be in the next issue of WestNews.

Please do come along to these if you can. It's always good to see familiar faces again, and a delight to see new people or those whom we haven't seen for a while.

I can report that the Committee is well advanced with planning for the 2019 program. The Annual General Meeting will take place on 9 February – further details will be given well in advance. Even at this early stage I ask members to consider whether they might be able to give their time in contributing to Branch Committee. And – taking the lead from Singing Camp organisers – I ask you to think and pray about who might take on the post of Branch Chairman when my final term in the role concludes at the start of 2020.

I look forward to seeing you at our forthcoming events.

2018 JUNIOR CHORISTERS' CAMP Report by Lucas Phillips Camp Administrator.

The 2018 Singing Camp was held at the Swan Valley Adventure Centre (formerly known as the Swanleigh Residential College) in Middle Swan. Our Dedication Service was held at the nearby historic Anglican Church of St. Mary, with our Anglican Evensong Service being held at St. Matthew's in Guildford. The Catholic Mass was held at St. Francis of Assisi in Maida Vale. The decision to follow this model was two-fold. First, the choice of an Evensong service would coincide with our annual Choral Festival at St. George's Cathedral, which celebrates the music sung at Camp, and the second was that our remaining Sunday service would then fit into an already existing sung liturgy.

Our numbers this year comprised 8 residential staff members, with 4 other staff members who aided us when available. Making their debuts this ear were our Musical Director, Sarah Mills–Menogue, and Accompanist, Holly Broadbent. Despite their other commitments, both Sarah and Holly were immensely generous in sharing their talents with us. Along for the journey were 21 participants, ranging from year 3 to year 11. This year we trialled the use of an online ticket selling platform called TryBooking, which resulted in 5 new participants, a variety of enquiries, and was also used by 6 of our regular participants. Word of mouth referrals also generated 2 new students. We hope to develop the online presence so that it becomes just as effective as our existing ways of attracting students.

Reflecting on the changes that have occurred to Choir Camp (as we have affectionately known it), the continuing challenge is to balance the goals of Camp with the financial aspects of running such an endeavour. We are fortunate in having generous sponsors, as well as events such as the Fund-Raising concert at St.Michael's Mt. Pleasant, a Garage Sale (which was a new venture) and also fund-raising by Catherine and Elizabeth Baudains. St. Michael's Veterans chose to sponsor Abigail Fingleton, a member of their Parish, instead of their regular donation, thereby increasing their donation. Amelie Baker, the recipient of our Tony Peter's Memorial Bursary, was unable to come to Camp due to a fractured ankle before Camp began.

In passing the torch on to our new administrators, Jane Beaverstock (for 2019) and Theo Messenger and Sally Hemsley (for 2020), I am committed to supporting them as they carry Singing Camp into its newest chapter.

CHORAL FESTIVAL, 29th July. ST. GEORGE'S CATHEDRAL

Following two rehearsals with Chairman, John, 29 members, including Singing Camp participants and staff, arrived at St.George's Cathedral on Sunday July 29th for a final rehearsal with conductor Sarah Mills-Menogue, and Evensong.

We surprised the congregation by singing, "Hold up your Lantern" by Celia Mayers, which had obviously been a favourite at the Camp, at the font, before we processed to our places in the choir stalls. Otherwise, the service was a standard Evensong, with the Ferial responses, the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis by Charles Villiers Stanford, and enhanced with his joyful Psalm 150.

Precentor, Gareth Hughes, gave a relevant sermon, citing that any prayer was good, but prayer with music is even better. He mentioned that he was brought up in a small parish, and learned to sing in a choir that was often missing parts and had to "make do" with what they had, but that had given him an excellent grounding for the future—something very similar to my experience.

After the sermon, we sang the anthem "How Lovely is Thy Dwelling Place" set to Brother James' Air and arranged by Don Michael Dicie, with an added flute part, which was played by Tim Walker.

The evening was special for organist Holly Broadbent, as it was the first time she had played for Evensong. I thought under the circumstances the choice of the first hymn, "Bring to the Lord a glad new song", set to Parry's "Jerusalem" was a rather daunting initiation, but she coped extremely well—as with the whole service.

We also sang Green's "When in our music, God is glorified" to Sine Nomine by Vaughan Williams, and completed the service with Mason's "How shall I sing that majesty" to Coe Fen by Naylor.
